Dear Colleagues,

We are so grateful to have completed our fourth year of this project with so many outstanding colleagues. We are especially proud of our partnerships with pediatric oncologists at Children's Mercy Kansas City and Texas Children's Hospital. Dr. Nikki Wood and Dr. Omar Shakeel lead these efforts with the goal of improving survivorship outcomes, preventing cancers in those with predisposition syndromes, providing answers to families' questions and guidance on reducing hazardous exposures.

My colleagues at the Center for Integrative Research on Childhood Leukemia and the Environment and I had the pleasure of summarizing the state of the science of environmental impacts on childhood cancer a decade ago in [Childhood Leukemia: A Preventable Disease](#) (Pediatrics, Nov. 2016). We have come a long way in understanding environmental contributors to childhood cancers and we are proud to still be translating that information into clinical and public health practice today. Our colleagues have been eager to learn and incorporate this into their work.

From a more engaging and expanded website to interviews in *Time Magazine*, we are in an exciting period of growth for the program. As we branch out to share knowledge with others, I am grateful to see clinicians and others recognize the importance of prevention, begin to implement changes in practice, and grow with us.

Every towering redwood tree has a small beginning. Connected by a shallow root system, redwood trees grow in communities. They help support each other to withstand storms and flooding, and share nutrients. Like this network of cooperation, the [Childhood Cancer and the Environment Project \(CCEP\)](#) is growing through branching out and via a network of communities and support that began four years ago. This year we have benefited from Perry Sheffield MD, MPH (Region 2 PEHSU co-director) joining the CCEP leadership team.

Our support from Trevor's Law, via the Centers for Disease Control and the Agency for Toxic Substances and Disease Registry (CDC/ATSDR), has enabled us to continue our work in a variety of capacities. Our efforts have led to the growth of knowledge about environmental risk factors for childhood cancer amongst an ever-wider field of people, from health care providers to decision makers to the general public. Please read on to see how we have branched out, shared knowledge, and changed practices during this past year, including through numerous workshops, trainings and webinars.

Sharing Knowledge and Changing Practices



Our CCEP affiliated pediatric oncologists, Drs. Omar Shakeel (Texas Children's Hospital) and Dr. Nicole Wood, DO, (Mercy Children's Hospital Kansas City), have been integrating environmental risk factors into pediatric cancer care, answering patients' need for reliable information on how to reduce exposures to improve the health of cancer patients and survivors. They provide examples of where a consult service may be based including in predisposition and survivorship clinics. Having a trustworthy resource within the clinical team may reduce the anxiety that many families experience during their cancer journeys.

They have provided this clinical context in presentations at our workshops, webinars, and publications sparking interest from many clinicians.

Drs. Wood and Shakeel have become sought after speakers for programs that want to address the environment and child health. Dr. Shakeel spoke about "the home is a health intervention" for a day-long healthy homes summit in Houston for real estate professionals and parents that was enthusiastically received.

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We conducted in person workshops at Emory University in Atlanta and at the University of Southern California Wrigley Marine Science Institute on Catalina Island. Attendees came from at least **6 children’s hospitals, 7 universities, two cancer registries, as well as federal agencies.**

Each workshop covered a broad curriculum of the scientific basis for environmental impacts on childhood cancer incidence and outcomes including the epidemiologic studies on air pollution, radiation, solvents, and pesticides.

The days also included practical review of exposure reduction techniques accessible to all. Drs. Wood and Shakeel presented sessions on integrating environmental health into pediatric oncology clinical work and provided insights from their experiences in survivorship and predisposition clinics. Participants included pediatric oncology physicians, fellows, and nurses as well as Ob/Gyn and maternal fetal medicine specialists, epidemiologists, federal and state employees, and others.

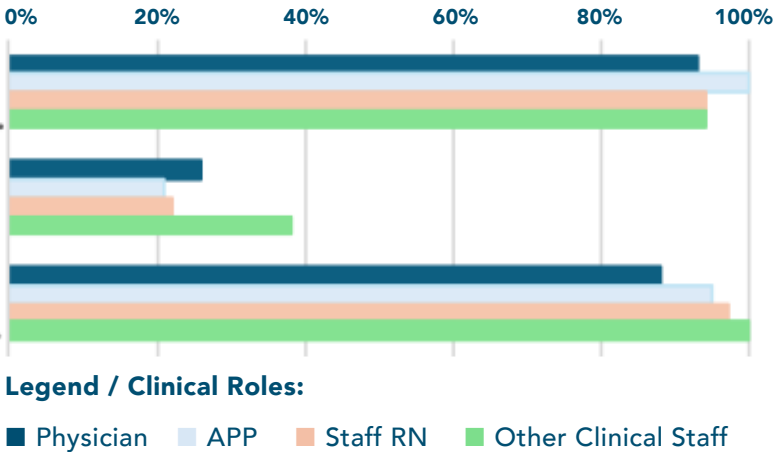
“Yes” Responses by Clinical Role

Providers frequently get questions about the role of environmental exposures and requests for advice.

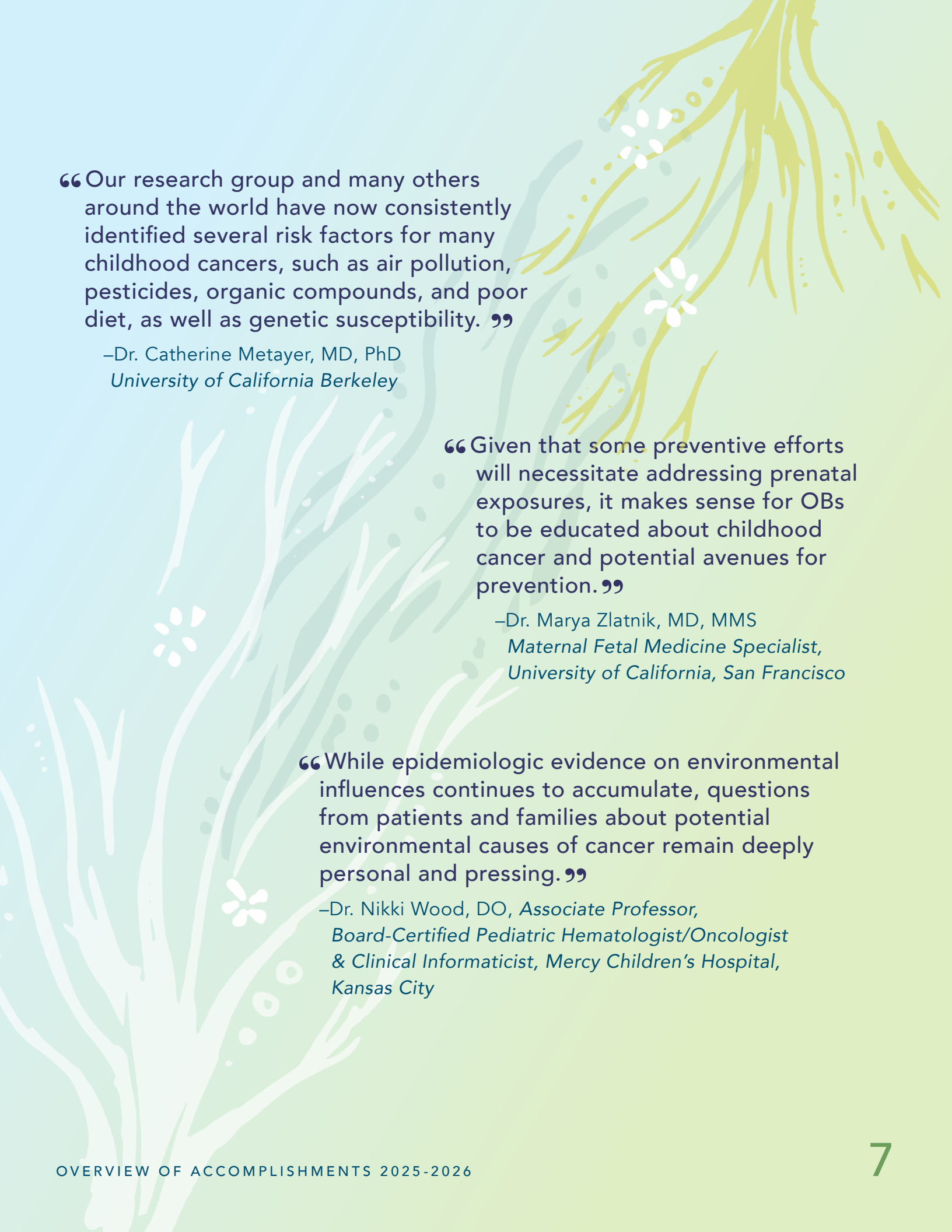
Over **90%** of pediatric oncology clinicians at these three institutions support the development of an environmental health consult service and would refer patients to it.



Sharing Knowledge and Changing Practices

With the leadership of our pediatric oncologists, CCEP is demonstrating the feasibility of including environmental health consultation within clinical practice environments. The goals of a pediatric environmental health consult service are:

- 1 Advance understanding of environmental risk factors for childhood cancer both to inform primary prevention efforts that may reduce incidence and to support survivors by minimizing exposure-related morbidity and mortality.
- 2 Reduce family anxiety by directly addressing questions about potential environmental causes of their child's cancer.
- 3 Provide current, evidence-based information on environmental risk factors for childhood cancer.
- 4 Offer families practical, low-cost strategies to reduce harmful exposures in the home and community.
- 5 Support primary oncology teams by equipping them with the knowledge and tools to engage in these discussions as part of routine care.

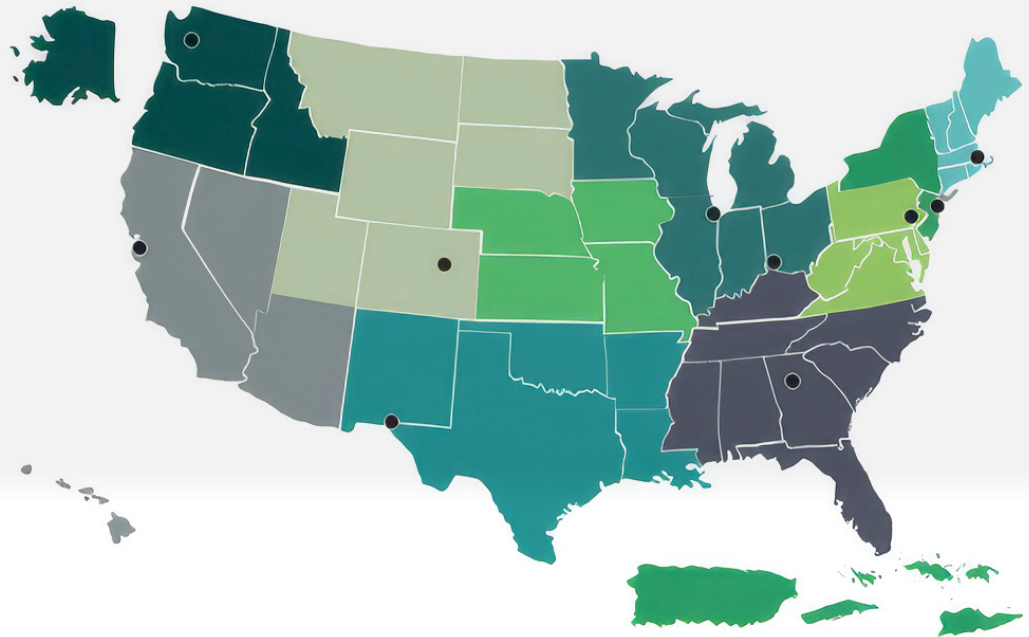

Branching Out

Surveys have indicated that pediatric oncology faculty have had limited exposure to recent studies about environmental influences on childhood cancer incidence or outcomes but are interested in learning more. The CCEP has added “Why are childhood cancers rare when environmental exposures are so prevalent? Gene x Environment Interaction” and “Radiation Exposures and Childhood Cancers” to our “science videos” collection. This brings the total of these teaching videos for clinicians to **10 with hundreds of views annually**. Regional PEHSUs educated professionals throughout the country about childhood cancer and the environment across regions in the following ways:

Region 1 PEHSU: In **Boston**, Dr. Marissa Hauptman and Dr. Alan Woolf presented an hour-long plenary session to **150 health professionals** entitled: “Unveiling the Hidden Threat: Environmental Causes of Pediatric Cancer” at the American College of Medical Toxicology Annual Meeting in March 2026.

Region 2 PEHSU: In **New York**, Dr. Hannah Thompson spoke to health professionals on “What we know about environmental exposures and obstetrics and gynecology and pediatrics” at the Cancer and Environment CME event in November 2025, hosted by Columbia University and Silent Spring Institute. Region 3 PEHSU: In **Pennsylvania**, the PEHSU hosted a webinar with **67 attendees** on childhood cancer prevention and the environment, with Dr. Mark Miller and Dr. Nikki Wood.

Region 4 PEHSU: In **Georgia**, the PEHSU hosted an in-person training for **46 health professionals** at Children’s Healthcare of Atlanta. Dr. Jinbing Bai, the regional CCEP champion is working with the pediatric oncology division to develop a consultative service.

Region 6 PEHSU: In **Texas**, the PEHSU helped organize the Dallas Children’s Environmental Health Symposium in February 2026 for **over 100 health professionals**. The event included a session on Environmental Exposures and Childhood Cancer.

Branching Out, continued

Region 7: In **Kansas**, Dr. Nicole Wood met with **20 Genetic Counselors** at Children’s Mercy Hospital, Kansas City. The session combined an overview of CCEP research translation efforts and prompted an engaging discussion on practical risk reduction strategies for children with inherited cancer predisposition, receiving highly positive feedback from participants.

Region 10: In **Washington**, the CCEP team led by MaryKate Cardon DNP, CPNP-PC published an article in Washington state’s chapter of the National Association of Pediatric Nurse Practitioners (NAPNAP). The article included information about childhood cancer and was shared with **160 Pediatric Nurse Practitioners**. The PEHSU also presented childhood cancer information to the Advanced Nursing Education Workforce program at University of Washington Doctor of Nursing Practice Program. This group specializes in rural or hard-to-reach communities.

Spreading Roots: Community Health Workers

Community outreach via Promotores de Salud and other community health workers (CHWs) is critical to delivering vital information directly to families. Our PEHSU champions in Texas and Washington state have been busy this year conducting trainings using our innovative flipbook materials for these essential health professionals, both in-person and virtually. Collaborations with family foundations and advocates has enlarged both our perspectives and reach.

CCEP engaged Community Health Workers (CHWs) in the last year as follows:

Texas:

The **Region 6 PEHSU** has continued regular coordination with EPA Region 6, ATSDR, the Border Office, and other regional partners to address educational priorities, training locations, and border-region needs. These partnerships and relationships are already helping us build our training calendar for the next fiscal year. The Region 6 CCEP program has trained **78 CHWs** this year. Erica Guerrero PA gave presentations about working with CHWs to educate communities about childhood cancer and the environment at CCEP workshops in Atlanta and Catalina Island, CA.

Washington:

Region 10 PEHSU presented on CCEP in March 2026 to **20 attendees** (CHWs and public health workers) from the Washington Department of Health. This group develops modules and hosts online trainings for Washington CHWs pursuing continuing education. In May 2026 in Vancouver, Washington, region members presented at a community baby shower hosted by the Southwest Washington Accountable Communities of Health (SWACH).

Idaho:

Region 10 PEHSU held an in-person training for **30 CHWs** at the Idaho CHW Association (ICHWA) annual conference in Boise, Idaho, in April 2026.

Jonathan Agin JD (Prep4Gold foundation) spoke with health professionals at the CCEP workshops at Catalina Island, California, and Emory University. He shared his perspective as a parent whose daughter passed away from cancer, and his continued work on advocating for children with cancer by organizing the first Childhood Cancer Prevention Symposiums and establishing a consortium of foundations to focus on childhood cancer prevention (Childhood Cancer Prevention Consortium).

KoaStrong Foundation founder, Lisa Pagán shared her story [in a CCEP blog](#) about losing her son to leukemia and using CCEP materials in her outreach to local schools and health fairs to advocate for childhood cancer prevention.

Judy Rees, director of the California Cancer Registry, spoke at our Catalina training, strengthening our ties with this important organization.

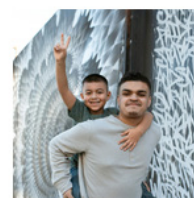

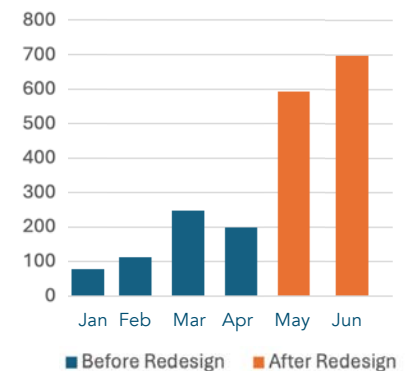
Website

We moved our primary CCEP website from Region 9 to the National PEHSU site and expanded [our program website](#) from **one page to 7 pages** in 2026. There are dedicated pages for families and communities, community health workers, and clinicians. These efforts resulted in an **over 600% increase in website visitors** from January to July 2026. Since the launch of the redesign, **the CCEP page** is the **second most viewed on pehsu.net** behind the home page. We also translated the pages into Spanish.

Webinars

The CCEP has a regular [webinar series](#) (every other month) which is hosted by Region 2 PEHSU CCEP faculty Hannah Thompson and Perry Sheffield . These are programs with engaging, cutting-edge science presentations that have had **338 attendees this year from around the country**. Attendees come from academic institutions, state, federal, and tribal agencies, the advocacy community, and the general public.

Our CCEP faculty have given invited webinars and workshops sponsored by other groups throughout the year with over **1,000 attendees**.

Recordings of this year's CCEP webinars are on YouTube. **These recordings doubled the reach of the webinars totaling over 750 people reached.** Dr. Joseph Wiemel's webinar on [Environmental exposures during the prenatal and perinatal period and pediatric cancer risk](#) has gained the most views.

Social Media Engagement & Search Engine Visibility:

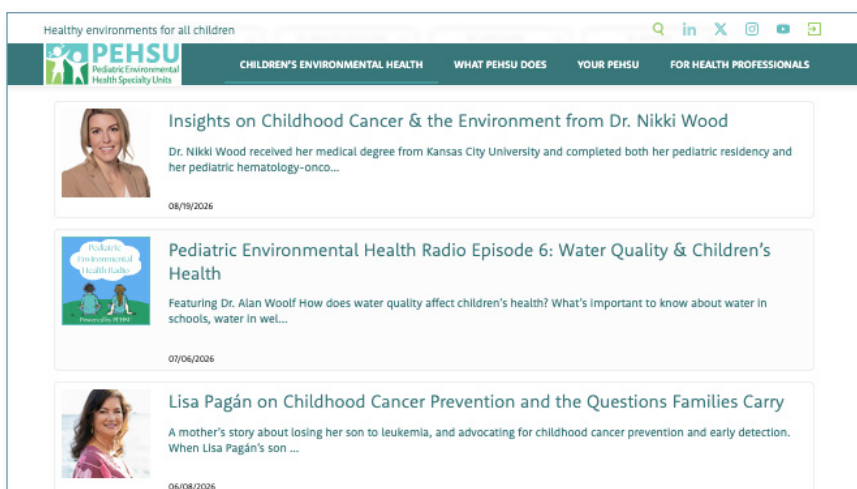
An online query: “Are environmental chemical exposures linked to childhood cancer?” The results, using artificial intelligence (AI), revealed **at least 7 of the 22 citations are from CCEP faculty and collaborators**, showing that CCEP is a highly visible resource in this topic.

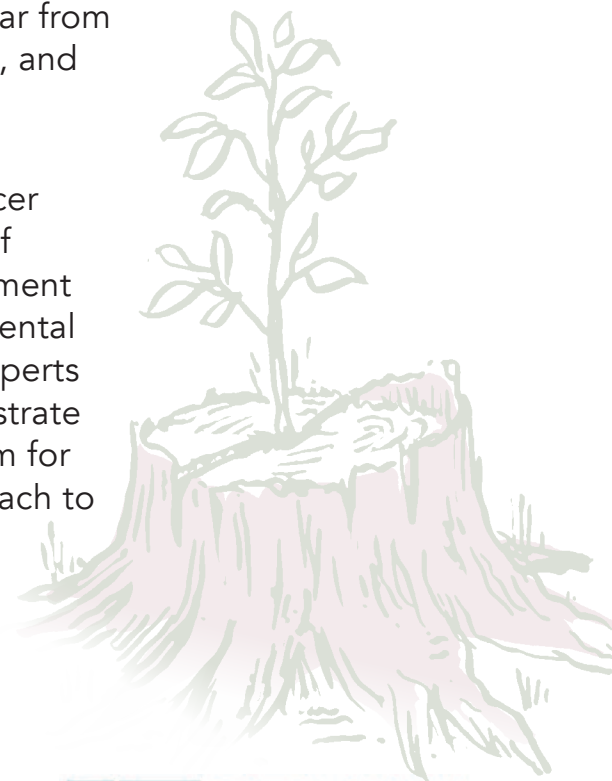
The success of this program is reflected in the calls this year from others, including a [medical society](#), [clinician researchers](#), and [NGOs](#), for new attention to childhood cancer prevention.

For the coming year, we will continue our current efforts highlighted in this document and launch a Childhood Cancer and the Environment Scholars Program in which a cohort of pediatric oncologists will get advanced training and implement a project within their home divisions to integrate environmental health directly within clinical settings. As acknowledged experts on childhood cancer, these vanguard clinicians will demonstrate the value of this work. We will also hold our first symposium for primary care providers. These efforts will expand our outreach to clinical communities across the country and help us make a preventive approach to childhood cancer a reality.
